



ZONING REFORM FOR HOUSING ATTAINABILITY

WELCOME TO THE 2023 REGIONAL SOLUTIONS EVENT



Housing affordability is an issue that touches every corner of Salt Lake County, influencing the quality of life and economic opportunities for our residents

"Zoning Reform" has become a loaded term, garnering strong opinions across the spectrum. Salt Lake County's decision to host the annual Regional Solutions Event on this topic is certainly timely but not intended to be an endorsement of state preemption of municipal land use authority.

Rather, the goal of this event is to convene many points of view - academics, policymakers, elected officials, practitioners, and advocates - to seek strategies through civil discourse and respect for the important and distinct roles we all play in bringing about solutions.

Local regulation is only one of many factors influencing housing attainability. Rising interest rates, escalating land costs, rising labor costs, shortages in skilled labor, supply chain constraints, material costs, and the reality that housing costs have for nearly a decade risen sharper and faster than household incomes are all factors contributing to today's challenging housing market.

Municipal leaders are keenly aware of the housing crisis in their communities and are working to find solutions in the areas they can influence. Both state and regional leaders are also concerned about housing attainability and what part they can play in supporting policies to bring about needed change.

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Dr. Arnab Chakraborty, AICP



DEAN, UNIVERSITY OF UTAH COLLEGE OF ARCHITECTURE & PLANNING

Arnab Chakraborty, PhD, AICP is the Dean of the University of Utah's College of Architecture and Planning, where he is also a professor of City and Metropolitan Planning. Chakraborty's research explores the relationship between zoning and housing affordability and collaborative planning techniques that can advance social and environmental outcomes. His work has been funded by the National Science Foundation, National Park Service, and US Department of Transportation, and has informed planning from local communities such as Lakewood, OH to national agencies such as the Federal Highway Administration. Chakraborty is an associate editor of Journal of the American Planning Association and a site visitor for the Planning Accreditation Board. Chakraborty moved to Utah in 2023 from University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, where he was a professor of urban and regional planning.

EMERITUS PROFESSOR OF URBAN PLANNING AND REAL ESTATE DEVELOPMENT AT THE UNIVERSITY OF ARIZONA, AND EMERITUS PRESIDENTIAL PROFESSOR OF CITY & METROPOLITAN PLANNING AT THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

Arthur C. (Christian "Chris") Nelson was the founder of Utah's Metropolitan Research Center, Master of Real Estate Development program, and Doctor of Metropolitan Planning, Policy, and Design degree. He also crafted the nation's toprated and most diverse online Master of Real Estate Development program for the University of Arizona. Chris founded the urban affairs and planning program for Virginia Tech's National Capital Region, as well as the dual master of city planning and juris doctor degrees between Georgia Tech and Georgia State University, the nation's only bi-university planning and law degree program. He is the author of more than 20 books and more than 400 other scholarly publications. Chris has also been a principal investigator for more than \$50 million in

grants from the NSF, HUD, DOT, Commerce, and EPA as well as foundations, think-tanks, and numerous other sponsors. His current work focuses on how to improve planning based on demographic and housing trends.
